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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The parent body of the college, Vidya Vikas Education Society, founded in 1962, by the socially concerned, dedicated reformers with an objective of holding light to those in darkness, extending support to helpless and guiding those who have lost direction, resolved to provide the opportunity of higher education to the underprivileged and working classes. Vikas College of Arts, Science & Commerce (**formerly Vikas Night College**) was thus established in 1986 as a night college catering to the higher educational needs of working classes with initial intake of 87 students in F.Y.B.Com. The college has since then developed itself into a multidisciplinary institution with 10 undergraduate, 6 post graduate and 1 Ph. D. research programmes being offered to the students from the central suburbs of Mumbai- from Ghatkopar to Mulund.

The college is an ISO certified institution and has been accredited by NAAC, Bangalore with B+ grade in the first cycle and A grade in the second cycle in 2013.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college being affiliated to University of Mumbai, curriculum planning and curriculum delivery is scheduled in the academic calendar taking into consideration the schedule of different activities prescribed by the affiliating university from time to time. Periodical meetings at the departmental as well as administrative level channelize the process of teaching-learning and evaluation in an organized manner.

Apart from total 10 undergraduate, 06 post graduates and 01 Ph. D. research programme affiliated to University of Mumbai, the college offers 68 skill-based courses free of cost to the students maximum of which are offered online. These online add-on courses are offered to them as a collaborative initiative in association with IIT Spoken Tutorials, Infosys Springboard, Aspire for Her- an NGO and ExcelR. The college has signed Memorandum of Understanding with these organizations for this purpose. Total 696 students had enrolled for these courses so far and 364 students have completed these courses.

The cross cutting issues like Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability are integrated into the syllabus taught in various programmes as follows:

Professional Ethics: 321 modules in 149 courses across 15 programmes.

Gender: 38 modules in 25 courses across 9 programmes.

Human Values: 153 modules in 75 courses across 11 programmes

Environment and Sustainability: 266 modules in 118 courses across 13 programmes

Apart from this, various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, extension activities, webinars and seminars, the college initiates to integrate these values so as to imbibe it among the students.

Total 1260 students in the college undertake project work, internship or professional training, etc.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

In 17 UG and PG programmes affiliated to University of Mumbai, on an average, 63.69% of the total sanctioned seats are filled and out of these, on an average, 111.89% of the total seats sanctioned for SC category are filled by the students from the same category. 5.33 % of the total seats sanctioned for ST category are filled by the students from the same category. 38.58 % of the total seats sanctioned for OBC category are filled by the students belonging to the same category and 7.75 % of the total seats sanctioned for other reserved categories are filled by the students from those categories.

The ratio of students and teachers is 34.92

All the 16 programmes offered at UG and PG level involve academic project as a part of experiential learning.

Internship is a part of curriculum of the programmes offered by Biotechnology and Medical Lab Technology departments. Industrial visit, is organized for the students of BAF, BMS, BSc (Biotech), BSc (IT) and BSc.

Seminars, interactive sessions, webinars, workshops, debates and classroom discussions are the examples of participative learning.

Case study as a learning method included in B.M.S. and B.Com., online quizzes conducted during pandemic, problem solving in mathematics and accountancy, use of computerized tools like R Tool and Sci Lab for this purpose, are some of the examples of problem solving used as a teaching learning method.

There were total 78 full time teachers in 2018-19, 72 full time teachers in 2019-20 and 70 teachers in 2020-21,

70 full time teachers in 2021-22 and 75 full time teachers in 2022-23 respectively. On an average, 27.99 % of the total full time teachers recruited have qualified SET/ NET/ Ph. D.

Grievance Redressal mechanism is prescribed by the affiliating University which is communicated to the students through prospectus and website. Revaluation mechanism addresses students' grievances relating to evaluation.

The college being affiliated to University of Mumbai, the objectives and outcomes are defined by the University as a part of the syllabus. The teachers also explain these at the beginning of the academic year and during the teaching-learning process.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Two (02) faculty members completed minor research projects in 2019-20.

The college has a recognized Ph.D. research centre in the faculty of Commerce. Three (03) scholars have been awarded Ph.D. by University of Mumbai.

All programmes offered in the college include project work/ internship.

Havhavishi Haak, a wallpaper magazine and the college magazine, **Rang Sandhya**, encourage the students to publish their creative writing. The Research Development Committee, in association with IQAC, has organized 12 workshops/seminars on Research Methodology and Intellectual Property Rights. Eight (08) research papers by the faculty have been published in the UGC CARE listed journals. Apart from this, 1 book, 2 conference proceedings, 6 chapters in the books and 2 papers in the research journals by faculties have been published.

The blood donation camp organized by the NSS unit of the college is one of the remarkable activities of the college. Total 2786 blood bags have been collected during last five years. Students of B.Voc. (Medical Lab Technology) assist the technical team in various blood donation camps organized in and across the city. The cleanliness drive conducted by the NSS unit every year in the neighboring area ensures a clean and hygienic environment for the citizens in the locality. Every year, in association with Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai and local NGO, the NSS unit undertakes Tree Plantation Drive in the vicinity. During the rural development residential camp at Vangani, volunteers help the villagers in cleaning the village, educate them on health and hygiene, solve their problem of water shortage, etc.

Seven (07) students from the Dept of Medical Lab Technology were awarded certificate of appreciation as Covid Warriors for their active participation in pathological services during pandemic. The NSS unit of the college has been awarded twice for highest collection of blood during the blood donation camp. Every year, six (06) extension activities are conducted by the NSS unit of the college. The college has signed 28 MoUs with different pathologies, educational institutions, NGOs, corporate etc. for the purpose of internship, professional training, faculty and student exchange, etc.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The 26 spacious classrooms with adequate ventilation, seating and supportive furniture with green boards and adequate seating arrangement for a maximum of 120 students and 15 laboratories in the college are utilized to

an optimum level in three (03) shifts. There are two (02) seminar halls with well-equipped audio visual facilities and one (01) auditorium with a seating capacity of 350 people. The college makes three (03) playgrounds adjacent to the campus available to the students for their sports activities. The college library has 46764 text and reference books, 40 journals, 18 news papers. The teachers and students are provided with the facility of online meetings and lectures through license meeting softwares like Microsoft Teams and Google Meet. Following ICT facilities are available in the college: 196 computers, 10 LCD projectors, 18 printers, 01 scanner, 02 barcode scanners, 03 laptops, 03 servers and campus wifi, 04 reprographic machines + 02 copiers and other ICT tools in different laboratories.

The college library is automated using ILMS software SOUL 3.0.1 that manages defined functional area. It has active membership of INFLIBNET, N-LIST consortia and provides 6000+ e-journals and 3200000+ e-books on various subjects.

IT facilities are frequently updated. All the softwares being used in the college for different purposes are the licensed softwares and get automatically updated. The bandwidth of the internet provided is 300mbps

Student Support and Progression

439 students were benefited by the scholarships and freeships provided by the Government under different heads in 2018-19. The number of such students benefited by scholarships in 2019-20 was 373. In 2020-21, 390 students were benefited by the scholarships. In 2021-22, the number of such students was 368. In 2022-23, 342 students were benefited by scholarships and freeships.

With an objective of capacity building and skill enhancement of the students, the college conducts various programmes like workshops, seminars, online courses, interactive sessions etc. on soft skills, women empowerment, computer and IT skills, life skills, etc.

In 2018-19, nine (09) sessions were conducted for the students from various streams. In 2019-20, thirteen (13) such sessions were organized.

During 2020-21, being the pandemic year, a series of online inter-departmental skill development lectures was organized. As a part of this series, 33 different sessions on soft skills, IT skills and life skills were conducted. Apart from this, an online certificate course in Communication Skills in English was conducted by the Dept of English. During 2021-22, six (06) sessions were conducted.

In 2022-23, 67 training programme/ online courses, etc. were conducted.

In order to guide the students on their career path, 18 events were organized in last five years.

As a part of the placement initiative, total 109 students have been placed.

423 students completing degree programmes from the college progressed to higher education. One (01) student, Ankit Singh, qualified joint CSIR-UGC NET and GATE in 2021-22 and 2022-23 respectively.

Two (02) students from the Dept of Media Production bagged first prize in 2019-20. Two (02) first prizes, one

(01) second prize and one (01) third prize were bagged by students in sports and cultural events at the inter collegiate and international levels in 2022-23.

Every year, the cultural committee organizes Jallosh, an intra-collegiate cultural festival and the Annual Sports Meet is organized by the sports committee of the college.

The alumni of the college are involved in the college activities in the form of career counseling, cultural and sports coaching, anchoring the events, etc.

Governance, Leadership and Management

26 teachers were provided with financial support for attending seminars/ workshops by the college in 2018-19. In 2019-20, 2 teachers received such financial support. One teacher was provided support in 2022-23.

In 2018-19, one (01) teacher and one (01) non-teaching staff member participated in FDP/ administrative training programme. In 2019-20, 27 teachers and 03 non-teaching staff members participated in such programmes. 21 teaching and 04 non-teaching staff members participated in FDP/administrative training programme in 2020-21. In 2021-22, 08 teaching and 03 non-teaching staff members participated in such training programmes. In 2022-23, 08 teachers and 02 non-teaching staff members participated in the FDP/ administrative training programmes.

04 meetings of the IQAC are conducted every academic year. The decisions taken during these meetings and implemented include signing of MoUs with different institutes and organization for placement, internship/ professional training, student and faculty exchange, online add on courses etc., organization of webinars/ seminars/ workshops.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The Women Development Cell of the college is committed to the task of promoting gender equity.

Various interactive sessions and workshops are organized on the themes like self-defense, gender sensitization, domestic violence, sexual harassment, pre-marital counseling, endometriosis, workspace skills training, etc.

The college, in association with Aspire for Her, offered online add-on courses to female college students. Apart from this, the Internal Complaints Committee of the college is committed to addressing the issues of sexual harassment. The Counseling Cell is constantly working towards the psychological well-being of the students.

The college promotes the cause of ecological balance through green campus initiatives like solar energy products, wet waste management, awareness regarding the importance of mangroves, energy audits, use of LED bulbs, recycling of e-waste, etc.

The institution places a strong emphasis on fostering an inclusive environment that promotes tolerance, harmony, and respect for cultural, regional, linguistic, communal, and socioeconomic diversity. Some of the initiatives towards this are celebration of Marathi Bhasha Diwas, Constitution Day, Social Justice Day and all other days of national importance. The NSS unit of the college inculcates the values of social service through the extension activities like blood donation camp, rural development camp, tree plantations, street plays, etc.

Installment facility provided to the students in paying their fees and the group book bank scheme are the two best practices of the college which help the students otherwise affected in their academic progress due to financial constraints.

The college is committed to the upliftment and empowerment of the underprivileged classes of society for which several initiatives like free online add-on courses, group book bank scheme, installment facility in the payment of fees, group insurance, etc. are successfully implemented.

- Academic calendar of the college along with university curriculum, academic and examination schedule is communicated to the students at the beginning of the academic year through college website, notices, prospectus and digital media like what's app groups.
- The college executes the term wise teaching, learning and evaluation process as per the academic calendar accommodating the alterations and modification in the schedule, if any, by the university.
- Entire process of academic progress of the college is monitored by head of the departments at the department level and the academic coordinators at the college level.
- Guidelines of the affiliating university are followed in implementing the continuous evaluation process
- The college conducts internal assessments at the departmental level following different methods such as class test, assignment, paper presentation, project work etc.
- Term end /semester end examinations are conducted at college level as well as at the University level as per the time schedule and guidelines of the affiliating university.

BEST PRACTICE NO. 1

1. Title of the Practice

Installment facility to the students on payment of college fees

2. Goal

To facilitate higher educational opportunities to the underprivileged classes and serving students to bring social reformation

3. The Context

- A majority of our students are from economically very poor background.
- Mostly, they are the children (first generation learners) of slum dwellers, daily workers, house maids and the people doing odd jobs.
- Annual college fees of the aided programs are around Rs. 5000 and of the unaided programs are around Rs. 20000, which is beyond their capacity to pay at a time.
- Though the college is not financially rich to provide financial concession to them, has planned to help them in the form of encouraging them to continue higher education by paying annual college fees in easy installments.

4. The Practice

- Usually, a notice is displayed at the main gate to inform the students that they may approach the Principal along with their parents, for installment facility.
- On meeting the students and the parents, the Principal judges and takes the decision on a case-to-case basis.
- Applications of students are considered and they are allowed to pay the fees in planned and easy installments.
- The college borrows the required funds from the College Management to pay the share of fees of the said students to different agencies concerned.
- Post collecting the installments from the students, the college refunds the amount borrowed to the

management.

GROUP BOOK BANK SCHEME

2. Goal

To extend support to economically poor students for higher education

3. The Context

- The Group Book Bank Scheme is a special book bank scheme of the college to provide books and study materials to economically poor students, on annual lending basis, at free of cost.
- The scheme functions along with the regular University Book Bank scheme.
- The books donated by the teachers and well-wishers are used for this scheme.

4. The Practice

- At the beginning of the academic year, a notice is circulated to invite applications from the groups of two economically poor students, those who want to avail benefits of the scheme.
- Applications are scrutinized based on the needs of the group and the availability of books.
- The selected groups are allowed to borrow a full set of books, as per their curriculum, for the full term for home study.
- Both the partners of a group have to exchange the books among each other mutually, as per their requirements.

- They have to return the books at the end of the term.

7.3.1

Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

The motto of our institution, “*PrajwalitoDnyanamayoDeepah*” a Sanskrit saying that underlines the responsibility to contribute to lighting the lamp of knowledge in society, guides us on the path of achieving the objectives of holding light to those in darkness, extending support to the helpless, and guiding the pathless. To light the lamp of knowledge in the underprivileged slum corridors of Central Mumbai, the visionary founders of Vidya Vikas Education Society started Vikas Night College with a single faculty, Commerce catering to the higher educational needs of the working classes.

This objective of catering to the higher educational needs of the underprivileged classes of society, the major priority and thrust area as regards the performance of our college, is achieved through the following features:

- The biggest night college affiliated to the University of Mumbai, the college is a multi-faculty

institution offering conventional as well as professional degree programmes including vocational studies to the students from the socially and financially weaker sections of society residing in the slum areas of central suburbs of Mumbai. Thus, the college provides traditional and need-based higher education to these students, enabling them to compete in the global ethos.

- Providing the opportunity for learning while earning, the college contributes to the process of social reformation as more than seventy percent of the students in college are first-generation learners and are from underprivileged classes.
- Ours was one of the few colleges in Mumbai selected by the UGC and was granted permission to start vocational programmes on a grant-in-aid basis in 2014, namely, B.Voc. (Medical Laboratory Technology) and B.Voc. (Media Production), thus making these vocational programmes available to the students from weaker sections. Later, in 2020, M.Voc. (Medical Laboratory Technology) was introduced to allow them to achieve mastery in this area.
- To make educational facilities accessible and inclusive, students with poor financial backgrounds can pay their fees in installments. They are also helped in getting the scholarships and freeships awarded by the Govt of Maharashtra thus ensuring no financial constraints would hinder their educational pursuits. To further motivate students, we felicitate meritorious individuals with awards.
- Students belonging to SC/ ST categories are provided with the facility of SC/ST book bank scheme which enables them to pursue their higher education without any barrier.
- To help the students on their path of education, a special group book bank scheme, in addition to the University Book Bank Scheme, is implemented by the college library wherein applications are invited from the groups of two economically poor students willing to avail the benefit of the scheme. Based on the need of the students and the availability of books, selected groups are allowed to borrow a full set of books, as per their curriculum, for a period of full term for home study. Both the partners of a group share the book on mutual understanding as per their requirements.
- The college has a class-teacher system in place ensuring all the students are mentored along their journey of education. A class teacher-cum-mentor is assigned the responsibility of mentoring, counselling, guiding the students from his/ her class apart from the regular teaching-learning in the classroom. They offer career advice as well as counselling related to the opportunities in the field of research. Alumni of the college are also invited to provide insights and networking opportunities, enhancing students' academic and professional development.
- Apart from their regular programmes, students are motivated to complete value-adding courses online free of any fees. For this purpose, the college has collaborated with organizations like Infosys Springboard, IIT Spoken Tutorials, ExcelR and Aspire for Her which offer a range of career-oriented and personality development oriented skill-based courses.
- The college provides every student with the Yuva Raksha Group Insurance Scheme facility introduced by the University of Mumbai thus protecting them from any mishap/ disaster causing threat to their health and hindering their academic performance. A regular premium is paid to The National Insurance Company Ltd. and The Oriental Insurance Company Ltd. for this purpose.
- The students admitted to the UG programmes with minimum passing marks or even repeaters at the entry level, with the planned and dedicated efforts of the faculty and the institution, exit with flying colours with a successful degree and placement opportunities. The efforts taken and the conducive environment provided in the college yields a significant influence in fostering such achievements.
- The institution's commitment to inclusive education guides us as we offer educational opportunities to SC/ST, OBC, minority, and differently-abled students making us dedicated to the

cause of diversity, inclusion, and equity. This helps in fostering a dynamic learning environment enabling the students from diverse backgrounds to flourish with a strong sense of community building. Installation of lifts and ramps for creating a barrier-free environment is not merely about meeting accessibility standards but it's about fostering inclusivity, empowering differently-abled students, and boosting their confidence.

- Advanced infrastructure, featuring classrooms equipped with LCD projectors, boards, high-speed broadband, and WiFi connectivity, establishes it as a pioneer in modern education. By harnessing technology to enrich the teaching-learning experience,
- Vikas College provides students with innovative resources that promote academic excellence and equip them for success in the digital era.
- Dr. Datta Samant Free Medical Advisory Centre on the premises takes care of the students' primary health as free medical assistance is provided to them in times of need.
- During pandemic, the college successfully maintained academic excellence by shifting to online teaching-learning with the help of platforms like Google Meet, Microsoft Teams and other technological features like Google Classrooms. Students were thus helped and motivated to embrace remote learning with technological assistance. Especially during the online examinations, the technical committee and the academic coordinators facilitated the process by constant online technical support and by resolving all kinds of networking and connectivity issues.
